

Electronic Repeat Dispensing (eRD)

Purpose	The benefits of eRD and how to recognise suitable eRD patients and how to find these patients using SystmOne clinical searches.
Scope	To be used to identify suitable eRD patients using SystmOne clinical searches.

Increasing eRD will have the following benefits:

- √ Reducing footfall to the GP practice and to the community pharmacy, supporting social distancing.
- √ Reducing workload [in the longer term] for prescribers allowing better prioritisation of resources
- ✓ Controlled management of the supply chain reducing the number of temporarily unavailable medicines.
- * eRD is only available to non-dispensing patients

Electronic Repeat Dispensing is essentially the release of a 'batch' of up to 12 months' worth of prescriptions to the pharmacy. This requires only one electronic signature from the GP/ Prescriber. 3 min you tube eRD video, Electronic repeat dispensing (eRD) | NHSBSA GP Practice eRD resources, letter templates etc.

All relevant clinicians, pharmacists, repeat prescription staff and patients must have a thorough understanding of eRD. This is to avoid the process failing if a patient's medication changes during the cycle and to ensure it is set up correctly again following medication review / reauthorisation.

Patients must give their explicit permission** (See Electronic Repeat Dispensing (eRD) – Patient Consent document found on Home-Knowledge NoW (nwknowledgenow.nhs.uk) for information about their medications to be shared between their GP surgery and a nominated pharmacy. This can be verbal or via surgeries preferred patient contact method.

Document via read code:

"Patient consent given for Repeat Dispensing information transfer" XaKRX, 9Nd3, SNOMED 416224003

**National discussions are ongoing to simplify the consent process but at the time of writing the above is required.

Patients who may be suitable for eRD

(See overleaf for clinical system searches to identify recommended patient groups to start with, also detailed in Appendix 1 and Appendix 2):

Patients who already have a Community Pharmacy ETP nomination and:

- have a stable condition(s). Avoid patients with complex medication regimens.
- have **not** had any unplanned hospital admissions in the last 6 months
- Have not had / nor likely to have any changes to their medicines in the previous/next 6 months
- Do **not** take any controlled drugs, benzodiazepines, hypnotics, medicines requiring frequent review e.g. lithium, methotrexate, unlicensed medicines.



Norfolk & Waveney ICB Medicines Optimisation Teams advise the following, if you wish to implement eRD.

1. Practices and associated Pharmacies already familiar with and utilising eRD

- Follow local advice regarding suitable patients and utilise the resources overleaf,
- ICB Medicines Optimisation Team may be able to support practices to implement eRD *where* capacity allows. **To request support email:** nwicb.repeatprescribing@nhs.net

2. Practices and associated Pharmacies NOT yet using eRD

Contact your Medicines Optimisation Team contact to request advice / support ONLY if you feel you
have the resources / capacity to spend some time setting eRD up.

Suggested groups of patients to start with:


• Stable patients > 18 years old with less than 4 - 5 items on repeat

Com.Pharm ETP Pat: >18yrs. < 3 items on repeat, at least one for Glaucoma (but excl, resp drugs, opioids, hypnotics, anxiolytics, antidepressants, pericyazine)

- **Excluding** opioids, hypnotics, anxiolytics, antidepressants, respiratory medication, drugs subject to current national shortage click link for latest available information
- **Exclude**: care home patients, patients **not** on stable regimens, patients who may not understand the eRD process /do not have support to help them, patients with complex needs.
- Examples of potential patient groups: levothyroxine only, eye drops for glaucoma only, oral
 contraceptives only, metformin alone for hyperglycaemia, oral breast cancer drugs only (with clear
 treatment end date), common antihypertensives.

Systm1 searches are available to identify the least complicated patients, who may be suitable. Please note: *more searches may be added. The searches may be amended following any feedback.*

Systm1 > Reporting > Clinical Reporting > Norfolk & Waveney > Medicines Optimisation > Electronic Repeat Dispensing



The patient record should **be checked by an appropriate clinician** *before* any change to eRD is made. The search list will still include patients for whom eRD is not suitable

Verbal consent from the patient must be obtained and an explanation of the process given. "Patient consent given for Repeat Dispensing information transfer" XaKRX, 9Nd3, SNOMED 416224003 "On Repeat Dispensing System" XaJus, 8BM1, SNOMED 414938004



NHS BSA - support for identifying patients -although lists will still include patients who are not suitable

- GP practices can obtain NHS numbers of patients who *may* be suitable
- Some practices will already have been sent this list from NHS BSA

Appendix 1: Electronic Repeat Dispensing (eRD) – Identifying suitable patients.

A number of local searches have been built on SystmOne to help identify patients who *may* be suitable for eRD. Similar searches are also available to import for EMIS Web.

These searches can be accessed via the following steps once logged into SystmOne: Reporting > Clinical Reporting > Norfolk and Waveney > Medicines Optimisation > Electronic Repeat Dispensing Please refer to the 'Running searches in SystmOne / EMIS' document for further details.

It is important to remember that not all patients identified in these searches will be suitable for eRD so each patient must be reviewed by a pharmacist or technician before proceeding with eRD prescriptions.

In order to ascertain whether a patient is suitable for eRD the following criteria must be met:

- Any routine monitoring, including blood tests, must have been checked within the
 past 12 months (or sooner if specified in the search criteria). If results fall outside normal
 limits the tabbed journal should be consulted to check what advice was given at the time of
 the abnormal result, for example medication may have been initiated or the dose changed.
- A medication review should have been completed within the past 12 months. If the
 review falls outside of this timeframe, it may be appropriate to complete a simple medication
 review with the patient over the telephone. For example, a patient is only prescribed
 metformin and the latest HbA1c was within normal limits. If there is any doubt as to
 suitability do not proceed.
- The patient must give explicit consent for information about their medications to be shared between their GP surgery and a nominated pharmacy. This can be verbal. The process for eRD must be explained to the patient and the pharmacist or technician must be confident the patient understands this before proceeding with eRD prescribing. Please refer to the 'Patient Consent' document for further details.

If there is any doubt as to suitability of a patient to be initiated on eRD do not proceed with the process.

Once it has been established that eRD is suitable for the patient the SOP entitled 'Setting up an eRD' should be followed.

Appendix 2: Electronic Repeat Dispensing (eRD) – running searches in SystmOne


A number of predesigned searches have been uploaded onto SystmOne to help identify patients who *may* be suitable for eRD.

These searches can be accessed via the following steps:

1. Select 'Reporting' along the top bar




2. From the drop down tree, select 'Clinical reporting'





3. This will bring a drop down tree on the left hand side. Locate the 'Norfolk and Waveney' folder. Click to expand this then select the 'Medicines Optimisation' folder and expand.



4. The locally developed searches can be found by selecting 'Electronic Repeat Dispensing'. The searches will appear on the main screen.




5. To identify the patients including in the search terms, the searches need to be run. Highlight the searches you wish to run then select the green 'play button'.



6. Once the searches have been run a tick will appear in the flag column and the number of identified patients will be displayed.

7. To view the patients, right click on the search and select 'show patients'. This will bring up a list of all patients who match the search criteria.
